UUMC will welcome new members in worship June 26 and at a special reception afterward.



These are 12 principles of Progressive Christianity written by lay-people and clergy from Phoenix, Arizona.

The principles are divided into three groups of four principles under the headings of: Love of God, Love of Neighbor and Love of Self.

Prior the kids heading off to the prom, Nottingham's tradition is for all children and their parents to meet at Thornden Park's rose garden for photos.

This is especially exciting as the kids finally get to see each other in all of their finery, to see who is going with whom and to solidify the plan of partying all night.

As parents we witness the children, many of whom we've known since preschool, present as adult men and women.

One also recognizes the evolution of the costumes worn, the support systems kids have at home and the partnerships the kids choose to take.

Many children attended their prom as a large group, some went as a traditional pair, some went as a same-sex couple and a few went as transgender.

As I took a minute to quietly note this moment in my mind, I included this: These young men and women, as goofy, as in transition, as excited, and as young as they are, might have figured something out.

This important milestone is not about how different each of these kids are, but how they all are celebrating together in the best way they are able. Gay, Lesbian, Transgender, Straight, Bi-Sexual, Differently-abled, Refugee, Immigrant, Athlete, Academic, Poor, Wealthy are labels that Nottingham's prom-goers might carry in other parts of their life but not on that night. This night was special.

Kids rejoiced, celebrated, laughed and carried on, equally accepted by their peers without exception.

As we morn the 49 individuals killed in Orlando, Florida, due to their sexual orientation. As we manage our patience in the redefining of United Methodist policy toward the LGBQT community. As UUMC prepared to proudly host the CNY Pride Interfaith Worship and march in Syracuse's Gay Pride Parade, let's learn from our children.

Plus, I love singing with so many United Methodists during times for worship.

An opening worship time was led by Bishop Mark Webb, a memorial service was led by Rev. Nola Anderson, a morning worship was led by young adults and in closing we had time for worship with the ordination ceremony.

This year during the business component only nine resolutions were presented, as compared with 54 last year.

A motion calling for examining the possibility of restoring funding for Campus Ministries in next year's budget was passed as was a motion to require every UNY congregation to appoint a Camp and Retreat agent with their leadership selection in

2016 to begin serving in 2017.

The Rev. Adam Hamilton, founding pastor of the United Methodist Church of the Resurrection in Leawood, Kan., conducted three 90-minute teaching sessions. You will learn more about his presentations in the coming months.

- Three-fourths of the UNY conference churches paid their

- ministry shares. There was discussion of this impact on our conference budget and the resulting program cuts, such as the SU Protestant chaplaincy.
- End of Africa 360 campaign was cause for celebration with over \$750,000 received!
- The UNY Conference delegates to General Conference gave a brief summary of their experience together.
- Prayer is requested for Bishop Webb. In August the Jurisdictional conference will meet and decide on bishops' appointments for the next four vears.


