Help out Welcome Team by chatting with visitors before and after worship

Ten first-time visitors came to UUMC on Jan. 27. And the Welcome Team was scrambling to chat with all of them. So everyone at worship is needed to help greet those sitting near them who appear to be new and encouraging them to fill out that yellow slip.

And yes, sometimes we make mistakes and inquire "are you here for the first time" to a person who has been attending for years. But isn't that better than a newbie going away without much acknowledgement?

None of the 10 visitors that Sunday left contact information. That's common. Apparently that is too much come engaged in activities and conof a commitment for most firsttimers.

When people do leave an address, the Welcome Team follows up by with a visit, phone call or gift that

very day. Pastor Alicia sends a letter as well.

The most common responses from visitors to "how did you find us" is that they searched online and found UUMC. Other common responses are they drove by the church or they were attracted by our rainbow banners.

Ten visitors on one day was very unusual, as we have not been seeing a lot of new people recently. However, our statistics show that in 2018, 76 local residents visited at least once and left some information. And this doesn't count out-of-towners or relatives. About a dozen have betinue to attend.

One new couple said they heard about the church from someone who attends - and it turned out the refer-See TALK, Page 5

Crucial Special Session nears; teach-in, vigil planned

The future of the United Methodist Church will be greatly impacted by the outcome of the Special Session of General Conference Feb. 23-26 in St. Louis.

Delegates will act on a report from the Commission on a Way Forward, which was appointed by the Council of Bishops, after examining paragraphs in The Book of Discipline on human sexuality.

A teach-in/potluck after church Feb. 10 will educate us on the proposals and process.

Whatever the decision, Bishop Mark Webb is hosting regional gatherings "to process the new reality." Closest one to us is 6:30-8:30 p.m. March 20 at Liverpool First UMC.

You can to pray in advance for the Special Session and the delegates. During it, Immanuel UMC, 303 Kasson Road, Camillus, will have a prayer vigil from 9 a.m. Feb. 23 to 9 p.m. Feb. 26. In person: the church will be open 9 a.m.-9 p.m. daily. Virtual: Go to their website www.churchofthebells.org.

versations have affected areas of the federal government's recent partial shutdown, the adjustment of the SNAP dispensation calendar

and eventual cutoff of SNAP monies to all benefactors in the nation.

The shutdown has ended, but there's a threat it could resume in mid-February.

We generated a plan of action for federal workers who might arrive to access food, we organized our food resources and we are actively filling our storerooms.

We've conversed with the Food Bank, which has assured me that they will support our efforts. The Central NY Food Bank has also provided this directive for all Food Pantries in their 13 counties that make up the central and upstate region of New York state:

Dear Partner Agency,

We want to provide you with information regarding the impact of the partial government shutdown on federal nutrition programs as well as your agency's day-to-day operations.

Due to the partial government shutdown, your agency could see new guests seeking assistance. We encourage you to take a few moments to welcome and familiarize them with the process for receiving food assistance at your agency. For food pantry partner agencies, please follow your normal intake process.

Our daily con- tance Program (SNAP)* February benefits will be deposited into stayed close to the current Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients' EBT accounts on or before Sunday, January 20, 2019. When speaking with guests who receive SNAP, please inform them about this early issuance and stress with them that this is not a bonus allotment. It is their February allotment and they should budget their spending of it accordingly. At mental Nutrition Program for this time, there is no guarantee of benefits for March.

> (WIC)* has sufficient funding for benefits and operations to stay open through the end of February.

School-based child nutrition programs are funded through March, including school breakfast, lunch, and afterschool meals.

We (at the Food Bank) will continue to provide information as it becomes available.

If your agency has seen an increase in demand as a result of furloughed federal employees connecting with your agency for resources and your agency is struggling to meet that need, we are available to assist you in providing food for these individuals.

We welcome you to please share any stories of guests that have been affected by the government shutdown to assist in our advocacy work.

Thank you again for all that you do to help provide fresh and nutritious food to those in need.

Food Bank of CNY

*The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) is the Supplemental Nutrition Assis- largest federal nutrition assistance program (once known as "Food Stamps"). SNAP provides benefits to eligible low-income individuals and families via an Electronic Benefits Transfer card. This card is used like a debit card to buy eligible food in authorized retail food stores. To be eligible for SNAP households must meet certain income limits.

*Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) The Special Supple-Women, Infants, and Children provides federal grants to states Women, Infants, and Children for supplemental food, health care referrals and nutrition education for low-income pregnant, breastfeeding, to nonbreastfeeding postpartum women, and to infants and children up to age 5 who are found to be at nutritional risk.

> Vouchers are provided to applicable families enabling the disbursement of nutrient dense food for women, infants and children.

> We at UUMC will continue to support our community to the best of our ability as long as there is need.

> I introduce this directive and information to demonstrate the shared vision of the Food Bank of CNY and to provide information as to what will be lost in the immediate future for guests and folk who visit UUMC each week.

Financial giving commitments dropped this year under 2018. The totals dropped from \$209,472 to \$203,474.

Sixteen pledges were increased.






