An example she mentioned was a Bible study with Hal Garman and Ted Finlayson-Schueler in which she read 80 percent of the Bible.

UUMC has evolved over the vears they've been here. When they first joined the church, the ushers, all male, wore gloves and always a suit.

And they're pleased with the direction UUMC is headed.

"I think we should continue on accepting everybody," Barb said.

Member Margo Koten said that the Cargos always had "a strong commitment to the church."

That commitment is easy to see.

A partial list of committees on which Jerry served is as follows: Library, History, Finance and Stewardship, Governing Board, Staff Parish Relations,

Housing Visions and the Neighborhood Linking Program, for which he was secretary.

Barb's involvement includes: teaching kindergarten and second grade Sunday School for many years, Sunday School superintendent under Ruth Hall for a year, Evening Guild charter member and treasurer for 15 years, Altar Guild for many years, Education Committee in the 1960s and '70s, Stephen minster, with eight care receivers, current Care Team, and helping Dot Logan and Rosemary Chappell.

Barb sums up their feelings as they prepare to leave: "We're going to miss our friends and miss the church, not only our friends at church, but the sanctuary, the beauty of the sanctuary. the messages from Alicia and the choir — the music — the whole music program is remarkable."

Course will help you have closer relationship with God, Jesus

Sister Joan Chittister O.S.B., author and lecturer, has revived an ancient practice to make it relevant to our time, and you'll have access to it in a course at UUMC. "The Rule of Benedict" was developed as a guide to early Christians by Benedict of Nursato in the 6th century.

The rules provide a spiritual guide and simple practice to help ground us and enable us to move into a closer relationship to God and Jesus Christ. which in turn, allows us to live life fully and to use our "gifts" to help create relationships and to be involved in our own way to be a part in resolving some of the issues of our time.

The course uses Sister Chittister's book "A Spirituality for the 21st Century." It provides a brief daily reading that relates to Benedict's insights for Christian living. The course meets six Mondays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. starting Sept. 9. Leader of the study is the Rev. Deborah O'Connor-Slater, a United Methodist pastor who in retirement is attending UUMC. Participants are welcome from other UM congregations.

Both are thrilled with their new locations and residences and ready for college adventures.


As we arrived into the college and university we were offered lots of literature about the community and neighborhood that our daughters will be living within.

Many of our friends are having similar experiences, and we've shared some photos of the information kids receive to assist them in living without their parents.

One contributed the image on this page and the following narrative given to students who have arrived to Northeastern University in Boston:

"This time of year we welcome tens of thousands of new Bostonians into the city. For many of you, city living will be a new experience.

There will be things that you find amusing, puzzling and disturbing. This includes seeing and interacting with the city's thousands of community members



who are experiencing homelessness.

The experience of homelessness can be incredibly stressful, challenging and extremely depressing. Many of our neighbors without homes work on a daily basis and return to the shelters to sleep at night or even sleep "rough," unsheltered on the streets, in parks or in train stations.

Many are elderly, people with disabilities or those with problematic relationships to substances. Others have mental health needs that are not being met.

None have access to the hu-

man right of a home that is safe, stable, secure and affordable.

Trauma may cause people to behave in ways that make you feel uncomfortable.

Offer them food and drink, support (of all kinds) and comfort when you can. Yet respect the boundaries they may establish.

Remember, the experience of homelessness often means a life without hope. And Winter is approaching. So please be kind.
