2020 plans made, goals set

Those attending the congregational meeting on Sunday heard details from church leaders about the Food Pantry expansion coming in April, Missional and Fiscal budgets for spring, as other pantries close. This 2020 and General Conference.

Missional goals include providing "meaningful, life-changing worship every week of the year," increasing average weekly attendance to 125 and bringing in 15 new members.

A new photo and address directory to help us know and connect with one another is planned as is providing meaningful spiritual growth opportunities for our members.

As part of witnessing our faith, we or more denominations. share our space with a variety of community organizations. With the day care facility moving out this year or next, we will look to launch a day care ministry. We will continue to aggressively market our second - and thirdfloor space. The upgrading of our restrooms, which has begun, is also part of this plan.

As noted by Outreach Coordinator Galyn Murphy-Stanley in her column on Page 3, UUMC is preparing to serve expand the Food Pantry this will mean doubling the number of people we serve and the addition of Tuesday afternoon pantry hours.

Church & Society will continue to seek issues that need to be illuminated through Teach-ins.

The Reconciling Ministries Team will keep the congregation informed on the actions of the 2020 General Conference in dealing with LGBTQIA+ issues and the possible split into two

On the fiscal side, 97% of 2019 pledged income was received. Projected 2020 income is \$360,800. Projected spending is \$490,149, which means deficit spending of \$140,349.

Furniture, appliances moved as food pantry expansion nears



Update: University United Methodist's Food Pantry expansion continues.

Many of us are deeply entrenched in the cleaning, moving of furniture, product

and foods and the reorganizing of the basement spaces within UUMC.

I've been meeting regularly with internal and external invested groups to establish and familiarize all with a newer method of meeting community, neighborhood, guest, congregation and volunteer needs while always being mindful that folk struggling with food insecurity understand and feel welcome as to where to access free, nutritious dense foods for themselves, their family and their dependents.

Our basement will reflect a space that is efficient, accessible, capable and user friendly for the large number of people and amount of food that we plan to move through our space.

New furniture has been ordered from the CNY Food Bank. We have been acquiring large deliveries of USDA/Free shelf stable foods from the Food Bank as they've become available.

I have been meeting with community grant foundations to fund the underfunded and financially bridge our expansion as well.

And volunteer meetings are planned for the near future to educate, inform and recruit others to our volunteer workforce.

Our administrative Outreach team has seen renewal with

many new members who are interested, supportive and invested in lending their voice, energy and efforts to UUMC's Outreach efforts.

We look forward to creating a specific administrative team that will focus efforts solely on our Food Pantry expansion and ongoing strategies in successfully building our new program.

I joined UUMC full time March 1 and look very forward to having the time and energy to secure a more focused effort and the time to execute tasks to build this exciting new program for our neighborhood and us all.

UUMC's Outreach ministry has a lot going on and is in a time of renewal and expansion. I explained our efforts more at the UUMC potluck March 1.
