It's Eastertide and time to dare to dance once again

Easter is just past and we're into the season of Eastertide, which will end with Pentecost on May 23.

Our worship series for the season is "Dare to Dance Again."

As Worship Design Studio, the series creator, says: "The Easter season is a time of 'coming out of the tombs.'

"In a year like we've had in 2020-2021, the tombs of death, economic loss, grief and unrest are obvious.

"Yet some tombs we need to emerge from are of our own making and we ask ourselves, 'What holds us back from claiming our freedom to really LIVE and to dance our dances fully?'

"No matter what confines us, the Easter message is one that offers the courage for new starts."

The key image for this series is the umbrella, used by Gene Kelly in "Singin' in the Rain," in which he sang, "The sun's in my heart and I'm ready for love."

"When we dare to dance together in spite of the pain, we proclaim our readiness, courage and celebration of the love that has, and will, get us through," Worship Design Studio says.

The weekly topics in this series include: "While in Their Joy: Dancing Sure," "With Great Power: Dancing Together," "By This We Will Know: The Dance of Love," "From You Comes My Praise: Guide My Steps," "Who Can Withhold? Break Forth!," "Gone Up with a Shout: Clap Your Hands" and "Spirit Poured Out: Dare to Dance Again."

Wrap-up on 2021 pledging

Twenty-two members and friends stepped forward for their 2021 financial pledges to UUMC for a total increase of \$18,716.

However, six found it necessary to step back for a total of \$15,920, and eight did not renew their pledges for a total of \$9,604.

In 2019, 55 pledgers committed \$203,474. In 2020, 59 committed \$217,360. And for this year, 46 committed \$204,940.

Let's pray and act to prevent crimes produced by hate



Greetings!

Sometimes I get discouraged with our society when I hear about the violence that we do

Alicia Wood to one another. I don't understand it. The recent hate crimes against Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders (AAPI) are historically sad and horrible.

Do you remember the scripture of the Good Samaritan? This week please reread it from Luke 10:30-37.

In this parable, Jesus tells the story of a man who was walking down the road and is beaten, robbed and left for dead.

A priest walks by the man. A Levite (a man of religious status) walks by the man. Then, a Samaritan stops and helps the man left to die on the side of the road.

The Samaritan (a very disliked group by the hearers of Jesus) goes above and beyond to care for the man.

I'm sharing this story because it may sound similar to what we have heard about the attacks on the AAPI people in the United States.

You may be thinking, "I would never leave someone on the side of the road for dead. I would help the man." I believe this is true of you. I'm sharing this story so that we may go even farther than helping once the crime is committed.

Jesus said, "Love God and love your neighbor as yourself."

I wonder, have you or someone you know ever felt that enraged or desperate to beat and rob another person? What has stopped you/them?

What could we do as individuals and a faith community to love our neighbors so much that we talk with people about hate, prejudice, rage or desperation before a crime is committed?

Do we talk with one another about race? How do we teach our children to love all people, stressing hate and discrimination are never options?

I am in awe of the Good Samaritan. He is the Asian American, Pacific Islander, Native American, Latino, African American or disabled person of today who is discriminated against, yet he stopped everything and helped someone in need.

Maybe he recognized the man on the side of the road left for dead could have easily been him instead. He truly did love God and his neighbor as himself.

Let's build relationships with people who are from different walks of life so that we may have the tough conversations about discrimination and the path to love and acceptance of our neighbors.

Let's speak out against hate before it becomes a hate crime.

Let's pray for all those who have suffered violence that they may heal in body, mind and spirit.

Let's pray for those who feel violence is the only way and that they may find the help they need today.

- the doors of the Narthex and the Sanctuary on Sunday mornings so all UUMC guests, congregants and the community can enjoy music, sermon and worship. Thanks to the Governing Board and Joyce Flynn for their speedy action and making this possible. Tables, umbrellas and bases were paid for by a CNY Community Foundation grant.
- In mid-April we will inherit 4 more appliances, clothing and books from Grace Episcopal Church. These refrigerators and freezers will become part of our Food Center and will provide much needed, addi-

When Restart reached out for donations of items needed to provide children whose families were moving out of Vera House's safe haven, many provided blankets, towels, dishes, cups, silverware, bibs, personal products and other items.

Some friends from as far as Florida made quilts with darling patterns that could comfort young ones.

Restart developed a list of items that can often run out quickly and registered them on

Recently, Walmart made a big contribution of items because the company cannot sell anything

that arrives in the warehouse within a damaged package.

Restart received some new futons, bedding sets, pillows and other items that will help when preparing for deliveries when clients have no beds or linens.

The Restart volunteers who unpacked those items recognized the love that would be felt when someone could start with new sheets, a comforter and a pillow on a bed.

Those who work with Restart often notice that just when something runs out like a kitchen table or mattress, someone will call and ask if we could use the very same item.

What can that be except God guiding us to spread love from others? Thank you for sharing your love.




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
